# TIANT PITCHES NO-HITTER

### Comments on Tiant's Victory

Harry was playing BLM. However, he has made some rule changes which will be discussed in the mail sack. They obviously will affect the replay of his games.

Harry's eighth inning smacks of an attempt to "maintain" Tiant's no hitter. So does the Angels' ninth. You should never manipulate the players inorder to provide another player better chances to do what you would like to have him do. In this case—pitch a no-hitter.

1) Harry doesn't say whether he attempted to put out Rodgers or Knoop on Knoop's sacrifice. If he tried for Knoop then Knoop should have been given a hit. If he tried for Rodgers then we have a problem. It could have been scored as a hit or a sacrifice. You would have to decide according to Knoop's SBA and his chances to bunt successfully. 2) Harry had Fregosi bunt -- this is ridiculous. Trailing by one run, with men on first and second and with one out no manager would have a batter bunting. If you did not think your runner on second was fast enough to score on a single you would put in a faster man. Bunting him to 3rd would be a distinct disadvantage for the offensive team since they would have to give up one out to accomplish it. As it turned out the decisions became even worse. That's because the defense took a long chance and went for Rodgers. They had just 4 chances to get him and did-- that's luck!! They had a better chance to double up Fregosi but failed. Harry's decisions certainly failed to take into consideration the game situation and the percentages.

Fregosi having bunted, the defense with one out should have gone for the easiest out! Give the runner third. He still needs a hit or error to score. The way Harry played it he first gave the advantage to the defense by having Fregosi bunt, then he turned the tables by playing to third giving Fregosia great chance to make first and leave the offense with one out and the bases loaded. The fact that Rodgers was put out was pure luck.

3) In the ninth, Harry had Repoz and Mincher hit and run. Down two runs in the ninth with no outs and one on you do not have your clean-up batter hit & run.

## The Mail Sack

The Mail Sack is composed of letters and letter-orders plus, at times, appropriate comments and answers by ASD's editor to questions posed by the correspondents. Contributing letters to this section, at this time, are: All Sports Digest, BLM, and Negamoo.

(From ASD)

Here are several questions and one suggestion about the actual play of the baseball game.

First the suggestion... Even though the pitchers SO rating effects the batters out determination, hitters that have a frequency of hitting into DP's(such as Stanley, Hansen etc) are not doing this. I have taken some of their fielding figures for the better thirdbase, second and shortstops and have applied them thusly:

A) On "A" grounders to these certain fielders (determined by number of DP's and assists and general reputation) there is no advance by the baserunner(s) regardless of the "A" rule.

Example: If the Dodgers had Haller on first and Fairly batting hit a groundball to 6A, this would be an out SS-1B only. This is unfair to the fielder(in this case say it was Gene Alley) because both men are slow and do hit into DP's often. Using a combination of numbers(SS and 2B must have a fielding total of 6 or under) Alley would throw to Maz for the force on Haller and then throw to first toget Fairly. If Fairly's SBA is 41 or less he is out. This method gives the better fielding players an advantage over the lesser fielders who because of limited action would have a high fielding percentage in less appearances than Alley or Maz.

Example: Brock on second base. Flood batting against Jenkins of Cubs, with Santo, Kessinger and Beckert in the infield. Flood grounds to Kessinger 6A. With my rule, only runners with an SBA of 43 or over may advance on these

types of grounders.

(Ed) My suggestion is-play according to the rules and forget this variation. You are basing your change not on statistics, but personal conjecture. No batter hits into DP's "often." With your rule, you will get too many DP's if you play properly and you won't get as many advances so you will score fewer runs than normal and your pitching performance will be too good.

BLM handles this aspect of baseball in the best possible manner- by pitcher, not by batter. You will be surprised, undoubtedly to learn that your "slow man" Haller hit into only 3 DP's in 1968. BLM bases its ratings on what a person-pitcher, batter, fielder- did do! They spent a long time analyzing the game and it should be played as shown in the rules.

Question 1. Would it be possible for you to rate the Tiger/StL 1968 World Series.

(Ed) I can not give any ratings for any WS.

Question 2. What fielders do I check after a batter has had his double bobbled in the outfield and stretchs this hit and error into a score?

(Ed) If you want- check the players as they would handle the relay: either shortstops or secondbasemen. You must know who handles relays and cut offs inorder to check errors in these situations.

Although skeptical, I do not have the computers to show unquestionably that a player cannot be rated to score within 4 points of his season total (which is often in the thousands) as every one of the Hawks is reported to have done. You probably realize, as I do, that this is virtually impossible.

### ASD'S NEGAMCO COLLEGE BASKETBALL DEFENSIVE RATINGS

The following ratings are for use with the 1969 edition of Negamco College basketball teams. I would appreciate your comments on the ratings.

Since all basketball ratings are based on real-life performances, but you often play the teams against other teams which were not opponents in real life, these ratings are subject to error. If at any time you feel that one of these teams is rated too high or too low you may change the rating or discontinue the use of these ratings and play in the regular way.

#### HOW TO USE

M equals Minus, P equals Plus, and E equals Even. Simply subtract or add the team's defensive rating from the shooter's FG rate each time the opponent's player is shooting. For example: If a player with a FG of 1-50 was shooting and the defensive team's rating was M2 the shooter's rate would be reduced to 1-48.
